## NEW YORK STATE HAS A CHARTER SCHOOL LAW!!!

As victory is declared, New Jersey retreats.

At about 1:30 this morning (Friday, December 18), the New York State Senate passed by a vote of 39-21 a charter school law. At 3:30 am, the State Assembly followed suit by a vote of 94-44. Governor George Pataki's charter law is strong. Its positive features include:

- the inclusion of the State University of New York (SUNY) board of trustees, which is comprised of gubernatorial appointees, as a chartering entity. Fifty of the 100 total charters will be issued upon the recommendation of SUNY;
- **schools** a blanket waiver of all bureaucratic rules, regulations, and laws applicable to public schools, except for health, safety, and civil rights;
- total freedom from state tenure laws and pre-existing collective bargaining agreements;
- total freedom from bureaucratic certification requirements for non-instructional personnel, including principals;
- total freedom for a charter school to design its own curriculum, decide its own school uniform policy, and set the length of the school day and school year;
- accountability measures including a five-year performance-based charter, oversight by the chartering entity and the Board of Regents, and a requirement that charter schools administer at least the same exams as public schools and meet or exceed all state performance standards;
- **≰** complete financial and administrative autonomy from local school districts;
- flexibility in teacher certification rules;
- unrestricted participation of private-sector partners and private educational firms;
- freedom from mandated union representation for 10 charters regardless of school size, and for 90 others if a school's enrollment remains under 250 children for the first year of operation; and
- **existing per pupil operating funding follows students to the charter school they select.**
