Roundup of the Fourth Annual National Charter Schools Week

April 28-May 2, 2003

t has been more than 10 years since the first charter school opened its doors. Today, according to the Center for Education Reform's (CER) studies, nearly 2,800 charters are open in 36 states and the District of Columbia. The schools serve almost 685,000 stu-

dents, and over 1.8 million teachers, administrators and board members participate in this movement, yet most people still do not know about charter schools; their successes; and their contributions to children, families and communities.

CER led the national efforts to celebrate the fourth annual National Charter Schools Week, supported by thousands of charter schools and charter activists nation-wide. While the state-level groups developed programs and activities

locally, CER ensured that charter schools received both Presidential and Congressional recognition, as well as significant media attention. At the local level, charter schools used this week to honor the teachers, parents, volunteers and students who make their schools a success.

The following is a review of National Charter School Week, including CER activities and events from around the country.

Monday, April 28:

Washington, DC: Visiting the Arts and Technology Academy, John Bailey, director of the Office of Educational Technology at the U.S. Department of Education, remarked "Charter schools ... have the opportunity to completely rethink the way education is provided but also have the accountability to ensure that children are not left behind."

Tuesday, April 29:

New York, NY: Undersecretary of Education Eugene Hickok was the featured guest at "Celebration of New York City Charter Schools" aboard the U.S.S. Intrepid, sponsored by the New York Charter Schools Association. More than 350 charter leaders, citizens and opinion makers were present.

Wednesday, April 30:

Washington, DC: CER sponsored the "First Annual Lesson on Capitol Hill," with Deputy Secretary of
