"Speaking of turkeys, Uncle Keith, remember the Alamo? Well, there's another big battle being fought in Texas right now as we speak! At this time last year, a bunch of white, rural Republican turkeys killed a bill to give poor and needy kids a chance at the education they deserve. Earlier this month, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick "declare[d] school vouchers an emergency item to allow lawmakers to get a head start on pushing the bill through the Legislature. By law, the Legislature cannot pass any bills within the first 60 days of the session unless the governor has deemed them emergency items. If Gov. Abbott names school choice an emergency item, the Senate will take up and pass school choice in the early weeks of session, instead of having to wait 60 days until March."

Americans already celebrated the holiday at different times in different places, but Hale wanted a specific national day of giving thanks...for the blessings received during the past year. The Civil War context made such a day even more necessary, as both sides occasionally proclaimed days of Thanksgiving to recognize and potentially foster divine support for their respective causes."
